TSF 2/5 UPDATE

Works along the Murchison Highway are continuing to manage groundwater rising to the surface. The works include drilling, cementing and ground stabilisation and installation of an open drain, sometimes called a French drain, to capture groundwater and pipe it back to the Rosebery effluent treatment plant. Over the next few months you can expect to see a range of heavy machinery used for this work such as excavators, rock breakers, trucks and pipe welders.

Additional traffic signage has been placed on the Murchison Highway to help motorists navigate the works area and ease traffic flow. Further changes to traffic conditions will need to be made from time to time depending on the nature of the works and to improve road safety.

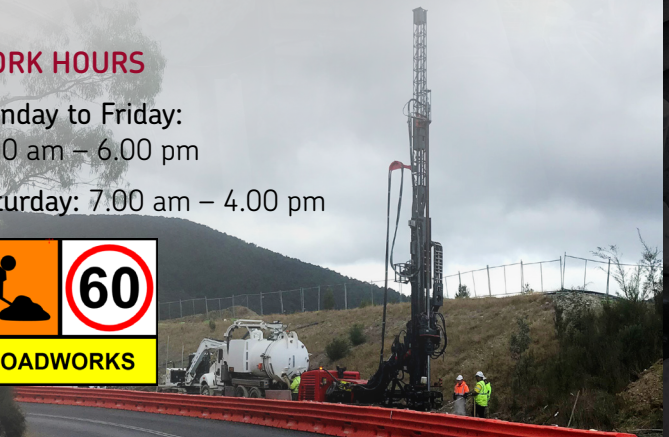
Construction of the Stage 2 dam wall raise continues with rock placement, grading and compaction activities being carried out daily by heavy machinery and a construction crew. We have a dedicated water truck in the area to minimise dust impacts.

IN SEPTEMBER 2021, ROSEBERY MINE CONDUCTED A PLANNING FOR MINE CLOSURE WORKSHOP IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF QUEENSLAND'S SUSTAINABLE MINERALS INSTITUTE.

This workshop was the start of ongoing conversations with the community of what Rosebery might look like into the future beyond mine closure.

We will soon be conducting Community Visioning workshops as part of the next stage of future planning.

This will be done in coordination with the West Coast Council and their Community Plan 2025.

The workshops will focus on discussing future infrastructure, services, land use, economic vitality

and social well-being of Rosebery and the surrounding areas.

2. WHAT ARE YOU WORKING ON RIGHT NOW? At the moment I am working on quite a variety of things which is one of the best things about the role. I manage the site occupational hygiene monitoring

program, work towards compliance with Civil Aviation Safety Authority for the use of drones on site for surveying, and I am developing a security training system, just to name a few. I am also an active member of the site Mine Rescue Team.
